Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative (RVEC) continues to demonstrate resilience and innovation, ensuring reliable, affordable and responsible energy services for our member-owners. Guided by steady board leadership and the dedication of our experienced employees, we faced numerous challenges, including

ongoing inflationary pressures and supply chain issues, while maintaining our commitment to core values.

This year, RVEC achieved our highestever Average Service Availability Index (ASAI) score of 99.9974%, underscoring our commitment to distribution reliability. Safely building

your lines right from the start, restoring and making repairs safely and quickly, and using technology where practical all contribute to providing you with the most reliable service.

In 2023, the RVEC board approved the first rate increase in seven years, which took effect on April 1, 2024. This increase was not due to rising energy costs but was necessary because increasing operating costs, including materials, supplies and equipment, outpaced our ability to maintain operations under existing rates.

RVEC is challenged by its small size, a meter density of 1.9 meters per mile of line, and high power costs. Rate stability is the board's primary financial goal. To achieve this, the board establishes policies aimed at growth in our service territory. Our proactive approach includes leveraging U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) programs for

zero-interest loans, promoting business expansion and increasing kilowatt-hour sales, all of which help with rate stability.

We also prioritized member engagement and satisfaction. Our American Consumer Satisfaction Index (ACSI) survey yielded the highest scores in a decade, reflecting vour trust and confidence in our services. We remain dedicated to listening to your feedback and adapting to meet your needs. Your input is invaluable as we navigate the evolving energy sector and plan for the future.

Thank you for your continued trust and support. Together, we will navigate the challenges and opportunities ahead, ensuring RVEC remains your reliable energy partner.



## POWER SUPPLY REPORT

Corn Belt Power Cooperative's (Corn Belt Power) theme for 2023 was "Blueprinting for our Future." The theme encapsulates the essence of progress and growth in a world driven by innovation and constant change. As we navigate the ever-evolving landscape of our industry, it is crucial to proactively

prepare for the future while upholding the high service standards our member-cooperatives rely on.

Financially, Corn Belt Power remains robust, exemplified by the \$8,777,858 returned to its membership through annual quick rolls and patronage payments. Achieving an "A" rating from both S&P Global Ratings and Kroll Bond Rating Agency further underscores the cooperative's financial strength.

#### Advocating for reliability and affordability

Corn Belt Power continues to

collaborate with policymakers and regulators on state and federal levels, advocating for an inclusive "all-ofthe-above" generation strategy in response to challenges outlined in the North American Electric Reliability (NERC) reports on the 2023 Summer and Winter Reliability Assessments. This strategic initiative aims to incorporate all energy sources, ensuring reliability and affordability in the face of operational challenges observed in the Southwest Power Pool (SPP) system.

Corn Belt Power began to see benefits from its new battery storage facility. Throughout 2023, the system realized \$277,260 in savings using the battery during times of peak electric demand. When added to the entire load management system, Corn Belt Power saved members more than \$2.3 million in demand charges.

Corn Belt Power's vigilance extended to its Wisdom Station power plant and shared coal units on the Missouri River. These units continue to provide vital peaking and baseload generation when needed despite reduced utilization compared to five years ago.

#### **Investments in system upgrades**

Membership in the SPP regional tariff continued to yield positive economic results, leading to the upgrade or rebuilding of 69.72 miles of transmission line. Simultaneously, electrical maintenance and meter crews undertook significant infrastructure improvements, replacing aging components, upgrading relays and wiring, and installing new radios and fiber connections across the system.

The cooperative also addressed the need for modernized storage facilities, opening a new vehicle storage facility in 2023 to accommodate the growth and increased size of equipment over the past 70 years.

In the realm of cybersecurity, Corn Belt Power made notable strides by introducing a new phone system, security update service, disaster recovery procedure and security protocols. A comprehensive cybersecurity penetration test at the end of 2023 ensures a robust defense against potential threats, reflecting the cooperative's commitment to technological resilience.

#### **Embracing a dynamic energy** landscape

In 2023, Corn Belt Power embraced the theme "Blueprinting for our Future" within the dynamic energy industry landscape. With a dedicated focus on progress and growth, the cooperative proactively prepared for the future while maintaining high service standards. From fortifying transmission infrastructure to safeguarding technology assets, Corn Belt Power persistently strides toward the future, committed to delivering safe, reliable and affordable services.

Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative (RVEC) serves 2,100 member-owners with 2,773 meters through 1,447 miles of distribution line in nine counties. ## NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

#### Audit and financial health:

Raccoon Valley Electric Cooperative's (RVEC) books were audited by Eide Bailly LLP. The audit, presented to the board in March 2023, confirmed that all financial and accounting procedures adhere to generally accepted auditing standards.

Margins and allocations: RVEC's operating margin for 2023 was \$27,621. The total year-end margin was \$1,567,177, which includes operating margins, interest, patronage allocations from other cooperatives and extraordinary income. Patronage from Corn Belt Power Cooperative (Corn Belt Power) and Basin Electric Power Cooperative totaled \$1,251,428,

representing future payments promised by RVEC's power providers.

Patronage dividends: In 2023, RVEC's board retired \$716,383 in patronage dividends to member-owners, including \$499,482 from Corn Belt Power's 2022 margin, \$199,987 from RVEC's 2002 margins, and \$16,914 from estates.

#### **Electric revenue and power costs:**

RVEC's 2023 electric revenue was \$15.026.577 from 134.210.162 kWh sold, with power costs totaling \$9,812,059. The peak power demand with Corn Belt Power was 28,624 kW in October 2023. Community solar arrays produced 1,337,574 kWh, with power costs of \$145,274 billed to RVEC through its subsidiary, Raccoon Valley Visionary Corp. (RVVC).

**Operational challenges and** improvements: RVEC faced rising material prices and shipping delays but maintained inventory for its construction work plan. The office improved systems like SmartHub for data usage tracking, online bill payments, outage management and cybersecurity.


**Development loans: RVEC's** balance sheet reflects increased development loans to support local economic growth. In 2023, RVEC issued four new loans totaling \$5,390,700 through a USDA zerointerest loan program. The accounts receivable also include a loan to Sac Economic Tourism and Development for industrial park land purchased in August 2022.

## VOLUNTARY AND OPEN MEMBERSHIP

Membership in a cooperative is open to all persons who can reasonably use its services and stand willing to accept the responsibilities of membership, regardless of race, religion, gender or economic circumstances.

#### MEMBERS' ECONOMIC **PARTICIPATION**



Members contribute equitably to, and democratically control, the capital of their cooperative. At least part of that capital remains the common property of the cooperative. Members allocate surpluses for any or all of the following purposes: developing the cooperative; setting up reserves; benefiting members in proportion to their transactions with the cooperative; and supporting other activities approved by the membership.



#### **COOPERATION AMONG** COOPERATIVES

By working together through local, national, regional, and international structures, cooperatives improve services, bolster local economies and deal more effectively with social and community needs.





Cooperatives work for the development of their communities through policies supported by the membership.



#### **AUTONOMY AND INDEPENDENCE**

Cooperatives are autonomous, selfhelp organizations controlled by their members. If they enter into agreements with other organizations, including governments, or raise capital from external sources, they do so on terms that ensure democratic control as well as their unique identity.

#### The National Rural Electric Cooperative Association (NRECA)

is the national service organization for more than 900 not-for-profit rural electric cooperatives and public power districts providing retail electric service to more than 42 million consumer-members in 48 states and whose retail sales account for approximately 12% of total electricity sales in the United States.

#### DEMOCRATIC MEMBER CONTROL



Cooperatives are democratic organizations controlled by their members, who actively participate in setting policies and making decisions. Elected representatives (directors/trustees) are elected from among the membership and are accountable to the membership. In primary cooperatives, members have equal voting rights (one member, one vote); cooperatives at other levels are organized in a democratic manner.

#### **EDUCATION, TRAINING** AND INFORMATION



Education and training for members, elected representatives (directors/ trustees), CEOs and employees help them effectively contribute to the development of their cooperatives. Communications about the nature and benefits of cooperatives, particularly with the general public and opinion leaders, helps boost cooperative understanding.
